Pastor Mark's Faith Journey - Part 2

This morning I would like to continue with my Faith Story. During this present time of illness and uncertainty, I have been hearing a lot about an increase in burnout, depression, despair, and suicide. Those are very challenging struggles. Believe me, I know. Some of you know that I struggle with depression. I have also been diagnosed with panic attacks, anxiety disorder, and Childhood Trauma induced PTSD. You may wonder why I share those things with you, but they do play a significant role in my Faith Journey.

I did not have a happy home life. My time away with The Spokesmen singing group became the high point in my life, with most of the rest of my life being pretty gloomy. Getting away from home, and going off to college, seemed a perfect way to put the gloom behind me. I was given a pretty good faith foundation from the time I spent in The Spokesmen, and I was hoping to carry that faith life into my college experience. Unfortunately, it didn't turn out that way.

One of the first organizations I joined in college was the Chapel Affairs Committee. We were responsible for organizing weekly Bible Studies and Worship Services for the campus. I was sure that with my background, I would have much to contribute. Then I found out that one particular fraternity controlled the committee, and if you didn't pledge their fraternity, or if you were a freshman, you wouldn't have a role in the planning or the facilitating. Also, the campus chaplain was near retirement, and was very uninvolved in the work of the committee, so the frat boys and their girlfriends pretty much ran things their way. I quit the committee after three weeks. I spent several weeks visiting churches in the community, but never found one that was very welcoming or seemed like home.

I felt like God had deserted me. I was looking for the feeling I had experienced when I was with The Spokesmen. I realize now that was probably unrealistic, but it was the only meaningful Christian experience with which I had to compare. I became the typical college student, drinking too much, partying too much, hanging out with friends too much, going through a variety of girlfriends, and not studying enough. I just chalked up my religious high during my teen years to a once-in-a-lifetime experience that would never be repeated.

My faith wasn't doing much to curb depression, but, unfortunately, alcohol did. I found myself in a downward spiral and knew that I needed help. I saw a college counselor, who referred me to the local mental health clinic, but I wasn't ready to deal with the label "DEPRESSED", so I stopped going. I learned to live with depression without the use of alcohol, so I thought I was doing better.

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Then I met Connie, and things got a bit better. We got married, we started our new life together, I got a job, we bought a house, we had a baby, and then the dark clouds started gathering again - worse than before. I felt more abandoned by God than I had before. Some nights I would go outside in the middle of the night, stare at the stars, and scream at God to give me a sign that he still cared about me. Connie knew that something was wrong, that I was drifting into a dark place, so she convinced me to go to a psychiatrist. I did and was diagnosed with severe clinical depression. He started me on anti-depressants, and I did begin to feel better. The dark cloud wasn't completely gone, but at least I could see through it to a dim light.

During that period of time, we had our first child, Jessica, baptized at Connie's parents' church because we didn't have a church of our own. When we started talking about having another child, we both agreed that we wanted that child to be baptized in our church, so we started looking.

I was working at a hospital at that time, so I spread the word to my co-workers that we were looking for a church to attend. We received many invitations and visited many churches. We settled on the Presbyterian Church because it seemed to have the friendliest and most welcoming people, and, since our daughter attended the nursery school that met in the church, she was already comfortable in the building.

Connie and I became very involved in the church. We both served as Sunday school teachers, and we were both ordained as Deacons. I served for a time as moderator of the Deacons. I also sang in the choir, sang solos, was on the drama team, served as liturgist, and occasionally did the children's sermon. When our second child, Ryan, was born, he was baptized in our church, by our pastor, and was embraced by our faith family.

I finally came to the realization that God had not deserted me. I was just looking for God in all the wrong places. I knew that I should stop looking for what I had with The Spokesmen and begin to recognize what I now had: a loving wife and two beautiful children, a supportive faith family, and the opportunity to serve God in a new way. That was when I began to feel God's call to become more involved in ministry to the larger church. I say "began" because it didn't happen all at once. I pushed back for many years, but a tragic incident finally convinced me to move forward.

It was after dinner on a Friday evening. Connie and I were at a car dealership on a highway north of Alma. The sun was very low, and very bright, in the western sky. If you were driving west bound, you were easily blinded. As we were looking at the cars at the dealership, we heard a huge BANG at the intersection. An east-bound car, traveling at 55 mph, had t-boned a west-bound car that had turned left directly in front of them.

I checked on the eastbound car and saw two adults in the front seat. I checked on the passenger and realized that she was dead. The driver was moving and didn't seem to be bleeding anywhere that I could see, so I went to check on the other driver. She had been thrown onto the floor on the passenger's side. She was unconscious, but she was breathing and had a strong pulse. I noticed that the other driver was trying to get out of his car, so I went over to him, helped him out, told him to sit down, and propped him against the tire of his car. By that time I heard sirens.

When the emergency personnel arrived, I told them what I knew, and stepped out of the way to let them work. They did find two children in the back seat of the eastbound car that I had missed. A 10-year-old boy was seriously injured, but a 4-year-old girl only seemed to have some minor cuts. Tim, an EMT who was a friend of mine, called me over and asked me to take the girl until they could get to her, as she was the least seriously injured. I got a gauze pad to put pressure on a gash on the back of her head and took her in my arms.

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She was crying and calling for her Mommy. I started to softly sing children's Bible songs as I rocked her gently back and forth, praying that God would be with her. As I stood there amid that chaos, I felt a sense of calm and peace. She must have felt it, too, because she calmed down and stopped crying. Finally, they were able to tend to her, so I handed her to Tim and moved out of the way. I thanked God for being with her, and me, and said prayers for the rest of the victims.

That night I told God that I was ready to take a leap of faith, enter seminary, and prepare for full-time Christian service. Ministry has its ups and downs, but I have never regretted that decision. The depression makes ministry rather challenging at times, and that is the reason I am always up front and honest about it with my congregations. Hopefully, it helps you to understand me a little bit better. Also, as you learn a bit more about the disease process of dysfunctional mental health, I hope that you will become more sensitive to those around you who suffer from this illness.

This isn't the end of my Faith Journey. This is only the end of Part 2. It has been 30 years since I entered seminary, and there are many more stories that I could tell you about my Faith Journey since that time. I could probably write 2 chapters for my time in seminary, and a chapter for each church I have served since seminary. And, of course, you are the most recent chapter on my journey. AMEN.

LIBRARY AND CHAPEL AREAS OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

Just a reminder that our beautifully-renovated library and chapel areas are open to the public for use during office hours and for meetings after hours. Members and visitors who wish to take their lunch break, who need a place for meditation or prayer, who want to read or work a puzzle, or who simply seek a quiet, serene atmosphere are invited to spend time at the church. Guests should enter the building through the Jefferson Street doors and sign the sign-in sheet on the bulletin board outside the church office. Anyone who needs to use a chair lift should call ahead to make arrangements to enter through the Fellowship Hall doors.

The quiet areas include comfortable lounge seating, tables and chairs, a kitchenette stocked with free snacks and drinks, free Wi-Fi, and plenty of reading materials and jig-saw puzzles. Restrooms are located just across the hall. A freewill offering for snacks and drinks is appreciated; the donations go to the church's Local Emergencies Fund to help community members in need.

EUCC Historical Records Books

The Tell City Historical Society has provided us with some hardback Evangelical UCC Historical Records books. These books contain marriages, deaths, confirmations, and baptisms at EUCC for the years of 1871—1936. The cost per book is \$10. EUCC will receive 50% of each book sold. The books are available in the church office. A copy has been placed in the narthex to view on Sundays. Anyone who has relatives who belonged to our church during those stated years may be interested in having one of these historical records books.






Addendum to Church Directory Now Available

We have made arrangements for 3,000 bottles of water to be donated; we hope this helps us not run out like we did each evening last year.

This mission project is greatly appreciated by many in our community. Many of our volunteers reported having good conversations with the people who visited our tent.
